



OVERVIEW OF THE PARK

The Charlotte Park and Wildlife Refuge was a gift of the Demeter Fund to the Town of Charlotte in 1999. The Park lands total approximately 290 acres and include the "Overlook" purchased by the Town in 1973.

The purpose of the Park is to protect the scenic vistas, to preserve the flora and fauna and natural beauty of the Park lands, to continue historic agricultural uses, and to provide the public with opportunities for aesthetic enjoyment, outdoor recreation and the study of nature. 2.25 miles of gravel trails wind through wildlife and agricultural meadows. Hiking trails traverse the diverse woodlands and wetlands and connect to the gravel trails. Approximately 100 acres is used for agriculture.

Walking, skiing and bird-watching are popular activities in the Park.



PARK CODE OF CONDUCT

To protect Park lands and wildlife, and to assure the safety and enjoyment of all visitors, the following activities are prohibited:

- Bringing dogs and other pets
- Lighting fires, camping or remaining overnight
- Carrying weapons or bringing alcohol into the Park
- Driving snowmobiles or wheeled recreational vehicles of any kind
- Riding horses on trails other than those designated for equestrian use

CHARLOTTE PARK AND WILDLIFE REFUGE TRAIL MAP





Please remove your vehicle.


